We are writing to object to the proposed plans to introduce parking permits for residents only in Morley Road, Pretoria Rd and Saxon Close in Halstead. We have no objection to the proposals for double-yellow lines, which are long overdue.

The proposal for permit parking is justified as follows:

"A parking scheme will improve the parking provision for local residents and their visitors by preventing non-residents from parking during the stipulated times."

We find this rationale to be flawed in several ways.

1) No times are stipulated.

If this implies that permits are required at all times we believe that you must justify this on the basis of parking being problematic at all times. There must be survey data to justify this, or to identify times of day where parking in these streets

2) Local residents are not exclusively those that live in these streets

Local residents are all residents in the area, and yet many of these people who lack alternative parking are, according to this reasoning and proposal, "non residents". We object to the fact that permits are not available to residents on the west side of Head St. Unlike most of the residents of Morley Road, for example, very few in Head St have any parking of their own (onstreet parking is impossible and few have drives). It is unfair that residents that already have off-street parking of their own are allowed to apply for permits, even in some cases where their properties are not in the affected zones; for example properties on Highbury Terrace without exception have private parking, and yet they can purchase permits. We have been residents of the adjoining Head Street, Halstead for years and have parked in Morley Rd for much of that time. Morley Rd has a number of properties that have off-road parking and one side of the street (Highbury Terrace side) has only one property on which has plenty of off-road parking. In contrast to Morley Rd, Head Street has double yellow lines all along and almost no properties have any parking. All residents of Head St, not just numbers 14-48, need parking as much as any of the residents of the proposed permit zone.

3) No regard is given to the effect of forcing those without permits to find alternative places to park, which is both unfair

Making the proposed area into permit-only parking will cause problems in neighbouring roads (Colne Rd, Mill Chase), as the local residents that this plan ignores are penalised and obliged to find alternative places. I repeat, this is the case for many residents, like ourselves, who live on the west side of Head St. We all need parking to be available for ourselves and

our visitors, and this would be forced into these neighbouring streets. The day-time parking that seems to so exorcise the residents of the proposed permit zone would of course also be shifted to surrounding areas, worsening the situation further. We would draw your attention in particular to Mill Chase, a quiet road with a park and a residential home for clderly people which already has crowded parking that frequently makes it very hard to navigate the road immediately by the park entrance. Making a large adjacent area permit-only will make the parking in Mill Chase more and more contested and make it dangerous for the people that live there, walk with their children and dogs to the park, and drive their mobility scooters and wheelchairs along the road (which has no pavement). The proposal is a public health risk.

As with the previous proposal in 2015, which included only Morley Rd in the permit zone, it remains unclear to us why this area has been targeted for this when congestion due to parked vehicles causes more issues on the main routes through Halstead rather than this quiet residential area. Any resident in the surrounding streets who has no access to parking should surely have the same rights as those in the zone, if there must be a zone at all (we don't believe there should be). Halstead needs a comprehensive approach to parking, not one focused on the needs of a select number of properties which, in many

Under the proposal we would install permit holder parking only past this point signs. Past the point of the entrance signs parking would be for resident permit holders and their visitors. We will not be marking parking bays on either the carriageway or the pavements (which can occur in some areas where there is pressure on parking spaces). Although we will not be specifically encouraging parking on the pavements, a Civil Enforcement Officer will not be able to issue a penalty charge notice if a vehicle is partly parked on the pavement and the carriageway. It may be that any driver that does park their vehicle on the pavement may be committing another contravention such as obstruction, but that would be a criminal matter to be dealt with by Essex Police rather than the NEPP.



I think by now you are working on the revised Scheme. On the documents that you send me I note that the reasons for the proposal were:

The road is within short walking distance of the town centre and is regularly utilised by non-residents for parking. A residents parking scheme and the introduction of nominal double yellow lines in this and associated roads will improve the parking provision for local residents and their visitors and ensure that access and vision is un-obscured at key points, such as a junction, in the immediate

The provision of yellow lines will also reduce the probability of road traffic accidents.

However as during the day the roads are quite clear and it is only in the evening that the roads are full (and often it is already a problem to find a parking space), the evidence suggests that it is residents who are using the road, not non-residents. Therefore I fail to see how a parking scheme will resolve this problem especially if you are putting in double yellow lines which will only make the situation worse. I am opposing on 2 fronts:

With reference to the proposed commencement of resident parking in Morley Road. The road itself gets very congested with parked vehicles at all times. This is because it is the only road where it is possible to park on the side of the road where there are no houses, without parking outside a persons house. Houses are situated mostly on one side of the road, allowing plenty of parking spaces on the opposite side where there are no houses.

I,myself am able to park on the road just before the Openreach offices, which means I do not take up a parking space in front of a persons house, something which I might object to!

Also, the amount of road taken up by proposed double yellow lines near corners means that the road would be left with a shortfall of parking spaces, possibly as many as 18.

The reason so many people park in Morley Road is that there are a lack of parking areas which are not controlled by double yellow lines, or as in Pretoria Road, residents are able to park outside their own homes.

I myself live in Head Street, as do a number of my neighbours, all of which have double yellow lines outside our houses and none of us has frontage, which makes parking in Morley Road imperative for us, as no other areas in the close vicinity allow for that number of vehicles. I would like to know why you are, again, pressing ahead with your ill-conceived scheme to further restrict the opportunity for those Halstead residents who live in Head Street and have, many of us.

no off-street parking. Many have been here for decades, during which period they have been parking in Morley Road and surrounding streets, without any difficulty. Now you wish, at a stroke, to remove that option for no good reason beyond, one might infer, the chance to earn money for the councils concerned.

Previous attempts to force this through led to large-scale, fierce local opposition and protest, and the plans were dropped; yet again, you seem intent on ignoring the democratically-articulated wishes of hard-hit council tax payers and are trying to rail-road residents here into having to park a huge distance from our houses - where, I do not know. Suggestions might be nice - but you haven't any, have you?

Those of us with uneven numbers will be forced to fight for spaces, which don't exist, a long way from our homes and will end up having to carry heavy shopping and other stuff over distances which are, for many of us, impossible - and please don't suggest that we stop outside our houses, to drop off or pick up, since the traffic in our road is too heavy and the conditions too dangerous (despite numerous pleas to the council to introduce traffic-calming measures, because "nobody has actually been killed, yet" - you try living here and putting up with the lorries and other heavy goods vehicles roaring up and down the hill at all hours of the day and night!).

If you are, as seems apparent, intent on this most unpopular of developments, at least ensure that all, not simply some, residents of Head Street are granted the right to apply for a permit.

I would like an intelligent reply but expect to be disappointed.

Thank you.

Once again I have no choice but to formally object to this scheme as in essence about 40 car parking spaces will be unavailable for public use. Morley Road residences, most of which already have their own parking may be inconvenienced but he problem of parking will just be moved to other already crowded roads. People like me who have relied on using this stretch of road for years, which only has one dwelling on its southern side, will have to park elsewhere, thus just moving the problem of congestion to other residential roads ( which are also generally oversubscribed). I cannot park at the front of my property as Head Street has double vellow lines and although I have limited parking at the rear of my property changes to the out buildings will be unacceptable because of the listed nature of the property, not to mention very costly. The proposal ignores the fact that there are only a few houses on Morley Road which do not have parking within their boundary and the lack of housing on the southern side. Halstead has very few available parking areas and the side roads are an important facility for residents of the town and for many of the small businesses who rely on local trade. I now believe I would be eligible to purchase a permit and I welcome that, but I do not believe that resident only parking will solve the parking problems. How many permits will be granted? I agree that some limits should be set in regard to the crossroad junctions as visibility is often restricted by people who park carelessly. As a retired person I would not welcome having to walk further to access parking which would be much further away. I also think that restricting the parking to residents only would waste the available parking resource for visitors who take advantage of the spaces during the day. Would there be any available ' Free spaces' allowing for short term parking? Would resident permits be during specific times? What about visitors who only park for an hour or so when visiting? Do you have any suggestions as to where the parking should move to? I cannot think of anywhere which is not currently in use. Please inform me of any solutions or further action I would need to take to change the proposed restriction or to apply for the permit. Yours sincerely.

Thank you for your comments, we will need to consider any objections made after the consultation has concluded, be it from local residents or any other highway user?

Permits will be issued to any property included in the scheme which require them, with 2 permits maximum supplied.

We are unable to prevent "commercial vehicles" from parking as many households in the areas we administer will own or are required to take vehicles to a home address.

If a vehicle/residents activities are causing a noise nuisance, this would need to be referred directly to the local Authorities Environmental team for further investigation.

If the residents of Highbury Terrace and other locations have adequate off street parking then it is likely that they will not require permits however they have been included so that visitor permits can be purchased and to also appease any "ill feeling" they may have had by being excluded.

We will ensure that the properties mentioned below are included in our written proposal, however at this stage there would be no changes to the plan already devised for the area as this would invariably delay our intention to advertise, potentially affecting the delivery of schemes to several other areas in the District.

In terms of objections, it is not necessarily the number received but the strength of argument made against a particular proposal and this would be considered at the applicable time by a Senior NEPP Manager.

Advertising will be arranged within the next 2 weeks and all associated properties will receive a copy of the relevant order and map to illustrate our proposal, with the plan of our proposal depicting only those restrictions/scheme planned.

Thank you for your email and comments which will of course be considered when we are in a apposition to devise a scheme for the associated roads.

Whilst we empathise with local residents, this scheme will be devised and advertised with a number of others chosen as priority sites by the District Council member.

We are almost duty bound to arrange this in this manner as we are currently spending approximately £25 000 per annum advertising around 60 schemes in total and any deviation from this would invariably lead to costs rising, something we are keen to avoid as our funding for the next financial year, when this scheme and the others referred to would be advertised, is yet to be confirmed although we have every confidence that this is merely a formality.

We are currently engaged in delivering 60+ pre-approved schemes and this will occur between now and the middle/end of October, whereas any additional approved sites, chosen by our partner authorities at the end of this month will be included with schemes such as this, in the process described above.

Realistically however, we are extremely limited, and unable in most cases, in restricting commercial vehicles from parking in residential areas, even those included in parking zones, if they are owned/driven by local residents.

You asked for details of continuing problems of parking in Morley Road, so I'm reporting on issues over the past few day's. There was a car parked from Saturday 30 July until this morning 1 August blocking access to larger vehicles which caused problems with today's refuse collection's. The first problem arose when a refuse cart, from Biffa came to collect commercial waste from BT first thing today but just couldn't get through the gap. Undaunted the driver left his vehicle in the road and manhandled the heavy bin all the way from the BT Telephone Exchange to his vehicle. The dustcart from BDC came later today but also couldn't pass the car. However to avoid problems with bins not being collected again the owners were identified to the driver and the car was eventually moved. We don't always know who owns these cars and if a larger ambulance or fire engine needed to get through over the weekend the consequences could have been very serious. I attach photos, the first of the offending car and the BDC lorry and the second (of the Biffa lorry) will follow separately. The Parking Partnership suggest this problem will be resolved by restricting parking at the junction but it will not as this vehicle like the one before it two weeks ago was parked away from the junction and much further down Morley Road. In the earlier scheme the Parking Partnership made no proposals for this part of the road despite the ongoing problems. I hope in the circumstances they can be persuaded to reconsider. Regards

At the end of the consultation period we will consider all pieces of correspondence that has been received so whether correspondence is classed as an objection or not is not that important, it is really the contents of the correspondence that is considered.

I am sorry that I missed information in my previous e-mail, please find the answers below:

Now that it is proposed to include issuing permits to other and side roads, will the total number of permits be restricted to the parking space available? bearing in mind that the welcomed parking restriction at the Morley Road/Pretoria Road Junction will result in a loss of between eight and sixteen unofficial parking spaces.

No, there is a restriction on the number of permits that are issued to each property but not on the total number that are issued. The aim of a permit scheme is to provide priority parking by preventing parking by non-residents but if a resident permit scheme is put in place it will not guarantee that a space will always be available in the permit parking scheme.

With respect to the area in front of residents driveways, you have stated that '...penalty charge notices to be issued to vehicles that are parked in front of other residents driveways...', does this mean that residents of a driveway would be able to retain exclusive on road parking, across the drive, for a vehicle for which a permit has been purchased? (I am merely trying to ascertain that should I return home from work late evening, that I have somewhere to park/unload my van).

Yes, residents of a property are able to block their own property's driveway without receiving a Penalty Charge Notice.

Should we decide to opt for the H-bars, although advisory only, would any vehicle other that our own, be deemed to have parked illegally, if any part of a vehicle is over the H-bar? (Once again trying to ascertain if permit holders would respect the H-bars if they faced a penalty charge, whilst we retain an actual frontage that would allow us to turn onto the highway from our drive.)

I have attached the NEPP's enforcement of dropped kerbs policy. This says that 50% of the kerb must be blocked before a Penalty Charge Notice can be issued. I will ask the enforcement team to patrol the area and take action if they find that the vehicle in the photo is blocking your driveway

As requested, I have inserted a couple of photo's of our trailer for your consideration, both taken this morning. The first shows the problem of an unknown parked vehicle across our drive, that we are experiencing daily

In regard to the trailer, if it was left on the highway a Civil Enforcement Officer could not issue a Penalty Charge Notice as it is not a motorised vehicle. It may be that leaving the trailer on the highway is breaking other highway rules but, if it is, these would be under the jurisdiction of either the police or the highways agency.
